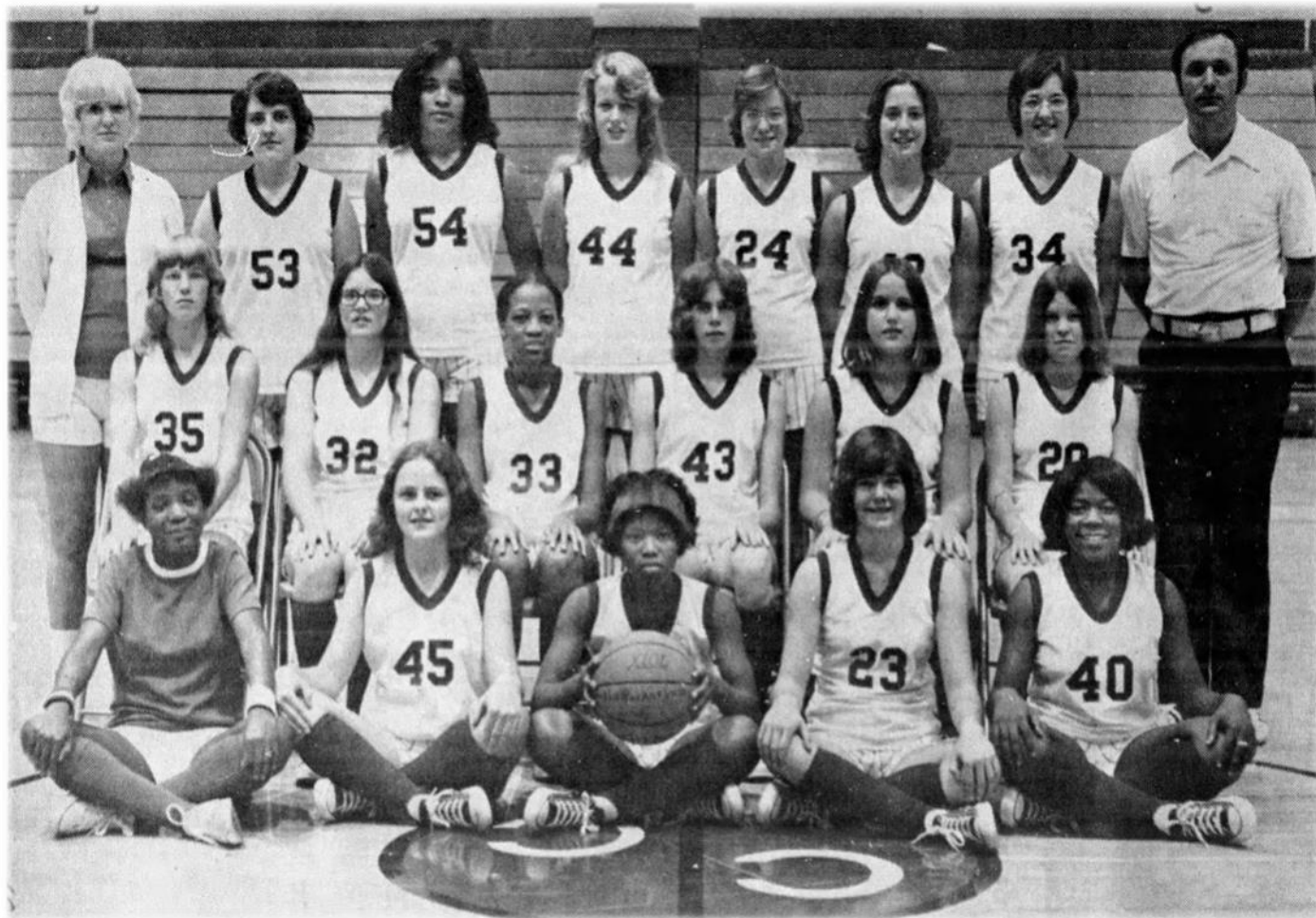

'Basketball Bill' not only isn't a boy, it isn't even close

Back when the world was young, in the late '50s, a brilliant (but unsung) basketball player sat with a girl in a car late one night. They were... talking.

"I played basketball once," she said.

"You did?"

"For our church team," she said.

"How'd you do?"

"All I scored all our points."

"All of them?"

"Uh-huh."

"How many?"

"14," she said.

"Did you win?"

"No."

"What was the score?"

"Well, I scored all our points—14."

"Yeah, I know. But what was the score?"

"72-14," she said.

Alas, the brilliant (but unsung) basketball player laughed out loud. That brought a chilly end to the... talking. The memory is revived at some risk today, for matrimonial bonds now unite these conversationalists. The reason is for a good cause, though. Girls' basketball in Kentucky needs help. It deserves it. Senators in Kentucky's General Assem-

bly soon will vote on a piece of legislation that would require girls' basketball to be offered at all high schools that have boys' basketball. The bill, introduced by Sen. Nicholas Baker, has been amended to cover tennis, track, swimming and golf, too.

Schools that do not comply with the law could be punished by having all varsity sports suspended for one year.

In a hearing last week in Frankfort, the Senate Education Committee took testimony in support of the bill for women basketball coaches, women athletic directors, women libbers—and George Chapman, who introduced himself as a "taxpayer" and "father of two small girls."

Chapman was eloquent. "The problem is this masculinized hangup we have," he said. "Man is a gladiator, woman is a cheerleader." Beyond that, Chapman said, "Some people fear girls will end up with unsightly muscles."

He push-pooched both ideas. "Women are gaining a feeling of worth through their achievements. Women climb the Himalayas, women drive stunt motor-

Cycles, women are jockeys—why not basketball?"

"As for unsightly muscles, any of you who have watched Olga Korbut or Cathy Riphey—what a myth!"

Chapman brought the issue to even more basic terms. "As a taxpayer, surely I have reason to ask that our children equally share the facilities we're paying for."

The Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA) doesn't like the "Basketball Bill," as it's called. Tom Mills, an assistant commissioner of the KHSAA, told the Senate Education Com-

mittee that such decisions are best made by each school. He would have the girl wait for a male-dominated power structure to say it's time we gave the girls' basketball team the same things we give the boys, cons might pass.

"Realistically, we're not going to get this opportunity for 10 to 20 years," if it's left up to local school boards, said Dr. Nan Ward of Murray State University's physical education department. "This is a thing we've tried to get done for 15 years now, and they're just not going to do it."

Ruth Webb, a student at Lexington

Henry Clay High School, offered graphic evidence of what can happen when girls want to play basketball.

"Forty-four girls signed up. We went to the athletic director, who is also the boys' basketball coach. He said he couldn't help us. We figured he was a little bit prejudiced because the boys need all the money they can get."

"Finally we went to the principal, and then to the county athletic director. We couldn't even borrow a ball from the athletic department. We asked the county athletic director, 'Why aren't the boys' and girls' programs equal?'"

"He told us, 'There's just not enough interest.' Well, we told him we had 25 girls signed up for soccer and 44 for basketball. That seems like interest to me. Then the assistant principal told us to wait to see how the basketball bill does—because the local administrators are the 'slowest moving.'"

"If it's not passed, this idea of the local administrators doing anything—well, that's just pipe dreams."

The KHSAA man defended the established system by saying 111 schools had

girls' teams last year, and maybe 200 will have teams next year. Barbara Call of the University of Kentucky's physical education department wasn't impressed.

"We do have two-thirds of the schools playing, but the standards are deplorable," she said.

Should there be equal money spent on girls and boys basketball?

"Definitely," she said.

It is here, I suspect, that the girls face their greatest obstacle. High school basketball in Kentucky is a treasured natural resource. To take money from the boys' game, to give it to the girls, may be considered heresy.

And that is dead wrong. Sports is supposed to teach our young people something. Patience. How to work under pressure. How to get along with others. Teamwork.

"Whether it's money-making or not, is irrelevant," said Dr. Ann Uhlir of Eastern Kentucky University. "These are educational programs. They are an integral part of the curriculum. There is evidence that youngsters can learn in athletics what they can't learn any place else."

Girls' Basketball Planned At GRC

Not many girls at George Rogers Clark High School can recall the contents of Senate Bill No. 73, introduced last January in the state legislature, but for high school principals across the state, it's "required reading."

The bill is an act relating to education, and one of its clauses states, "any secondary school which maintains a basketball team for boys for other than intramural purposes shall maintain the same for girls."

And if a school fails to comply with the law, which takes effect June 15, "it would lose its right to compete on the boys' level," explained Bob Campbell, GRC principal, recently.

"We will definitely have a girls' team," Campbell continued, but admitted that the new program poses problems.

Campbell, who disclosed that a coach for the girls will be named later this summer, pointed out that "one of our biggest headaches is that our gym is already in constant use" with the boys' varsity B-Team and freshman cage squads practicing there, sometimes until 9 p.m.

The gymnasium, of course, is utilized during the school day by physical education classes, and is also necessary for the girls' gymnastics program, which launched this past year. Part of the facility is also used for the football team's weightlifting training. The crowded conditions, added Campbell, forced the school to abandon hopes of forming a wrestling team during the past school year.

"And the gyms at Belmont and Conkright are tied up," said Campbell, agreeing that the use of one of the elementary school gymnasiums for the girls' cage practice "is a distinct possibility."

But Campbell isn't pleased with that prospect either, pointing out the daily transportation requirements in the use of another gym, "and many of the other schools don't have shower facilities," he added.

Another problem, adds Campbell, is money, estimating the cost of the program in the first year to be \$2,000, including the coach's salary.

"Most of our athletics are funded by gate receipts from our football and basketball games," explained the principal, who feels that the extra \$2,000 will pose a burden that "may force us to cut back in some areas."

How does Campbell feel about the legislature's move?

"I don't think the legislature was aware of the cost that is involved," Campbell replied, "and this is the first sport that's ever been forced by law," but he added that no state funding had been provided by the legislators.

"I think that the legislature wanted high schools to involve girls in their athletic programs," the official continued, "and that's good, for some high schools haven't."

Campbell, however, quickly pointed out that in the last six years, Clark has inaugurated girls' track, tennis, golf and gymnastics programs.

"Gymnastics was the route we had planned to take to get more of our girls involved in athletics," Campbell explained.

The Kentucky High School Athletic Association has ruled that a girls' team must play at least 12 games to be eligible to compete for a berth in the planned state tournament, "and if we're going to compete," added Campbell, "we'll do it on the highest level we can."

Campbell doesn't plan to work out a schedule until a coach is appointed, but is leaning toward games with the six other Mid-State Conference schools, beginning around the first week of December.

"I've been thinking about playing the girls' games on the same nights as the boys' freshman games," added Campbell, which, if effected, would mean double-headers on Monday and Thursday nights. Are the rules any different?

"If the spectators can understand the boys' game," replied Campbell, "they'll understand the girls'."

The principal predicts "at least 40" girls will try out for the team, which will include freshmen through seniors, "but how many will stick with it, I just don't know," he smiled, pointing out that many girls will put on their sneakers unaware of the long hours of conditioning and practice in basketball.

At one time, girls' basketball programs were common among in Kentucky high schools, but their numbers have dwindled. Why?

"I don't know," mused Campbell, "perhaps they were crowded out by other sports."

In the wake of "Women's Lib," that isn't likely to recur.

Girls' Basketball Required In Bill Passed By Senate

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — High school girls will have an equal shot at the basket under a bill passed Wednesday by the Senate.

SB 73 requires all high schools that have basketball teams for boys to maintain the same for girls. Schools not complying with the measure would be barred from varsity play for one year, if they could not show good cause.

The sponsor, Sen. Nicholas Baker, D-Louisville, told the Senate the bill isn't as revolu-

tionary as it seems, since girls' basketball teams were common in Kentucky during the 1920s and 30s.

Baker said arguments that it will cost too much are absurd.

"I don't know a school in Kentucky that doesn't have a gym or physical education teacher for girls — the only expense anyone's talking about is uniforms," he said.

Before giving it unanimous approval, the Senate deleted a provision that would have required all schools to comply

with the bill by the start of the 1975-76 school year. The bill now goes to the House.

The Senate also approved SB90, which would provide for privileged communication between a high school student and a guidance counselor. The bill grants counselors immunity from disclosing such information in any civil or criminal court.

After defeating a motion to send the bill back to committee, the Senate approved it 32-5.

Also receiving approval was House bill 53, which Sen. Georgia Powers, D-Louisville, said "would remove some of the last vestiges of racism from the Kentucky statutes."

A mechanics lien bill that would protect the homeowner was approved 31-0.

House Committee Okays Girls Basketball Measure

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A House committee approved Tuesday a Senate bill designed to force more Kentucky high schools to field girls basketball teams.

Ten members of the House Education Committee voted to report SB73 out favorably.

Sen. Nicholas Baker, D-Louisville, the sponsor, said a school district that could not afford a girls' team or could not find a coach would not be required to have a team. The State Education Department would determine whether a district was able to have a team, following a hearing, he said.

Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Lexington, said SB73 was needed because Lafayette High School in Lexington, one of the state's largest, requires girl teams to furnish their own uniforms and make their own arrangements.

Other measures reported out of committee included:

—HB 329, creating a board to select public and private elementary and high schools to receive certificates honoring them for their educational improvements. A \$1 million appropriation for such awards was deleted.

—HB 538, requiring elementary and high schools to teach the effects of alcohol and

drugs.

—HB 235, making completion of a one-semester course in consumer education mandatory for graduation from high school.

—HB 263, requiring first grade pupils to be tested for tuberculosis.

—HB 717, providing for tuition scholarships, beginning with the 1976-78 state budget, for college students enrolled in the Reserve Officer's Training Corps. One scholarship would be provided for each 500 full time students at an institution.

—HB 615, removing any restriction on the number of sick days a teacher can accumulate.

If the 7th Region champions win this year, it will be their fourth state championship and their third since 1971.

Five of the coaches said they thought defending champion Louisville Central would prevail against this year's Central, the 6th Region winner, downed Male 59-58 in the championship game last year.

The other two coaches picked by the Louisville Courier-Journal, picked Lexington Henry Clay, the 11th Region Champion. Henry Clay would be the first Lexington school to win since Lafayette became the state champion in 1967.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky's top-drawing basketball event — the Boys' State High School Tournament — is under way today at Freedom Hall with two of the state's top ten teams in action.

Lexington Henry Clay, ranked third in the season's final Associated Press High School Basketball Poll with 99 points, looks to the floor against unranked Carlisle County to open the tournament at 1 p.m.

The 2:30 p.m. game pits Bath County against Newport Catholic. Neither received votes in the final AP poll of sportswriters and broadcasters in the state.

Louisville Central, No. 7 in the poll with 17 of the 14 freshmen votes and 128 points, now Warren East to kick off the evening action at 7:30 p.m. The final game this evening, at 8 p.m., pits Owensboro against Asheville. Neither received votes in the March 3 poll.

Maryland Coach Optimistic Driesell Saber-Rattling

Most of the barn boding in the NCAA basketball tournament seems to be happening over the games.

The coaches of the 14 teams remaining in the tournament are being called on for more than their own teams, they are being called on for the country and its record books.

It's part of the psychological buildup, and hardly anyone does it better than Maryland's Lefty Driesell, R.I. coach. He has been accused of being a saboteur by Clemson and North Carolina.

"I've got to be a saboteur," he said last week, "but I've got to be a winner, too."

The four-region Topp, 24-4, overcame pesky Creighton 65-73 last Tuesday to earn a bye against No. 9 Notre Dame, 38-4, for the second round. Middle Regionals game Thursday night at Las Cruces, N.M. The other Midwest regional game this

No. 3 Louisville, 52-3.

"This is a challenge to our ball club and they've looked a lot like they will play long," Driesell said. "People counted on all year and they're again afraid to let me see them."

Maryland beat Notre Dame 90-81 in an earlier game in the tournament and the Topp again will be the "saber-rattling" one, according to Adrien Dandridge, who scored 29 points in that game.

Dandridge is a great offensive player," Driesell said. "In the past, he's been overlooked, but he's a great player. We'll stick a lot of different people on him this time, but one person does a good job."

Besides the Midwest Saturday night, there will be the East Regional at Providence, R.I., which has a positive attitude," Driesell said. "We realize that all it takes is four (more) games to win the national championship, and we think we can do it."

UCLA, the giant of college basketball over the past 12 years with 16 NCAA titles, has an unenviable reputation. Only Missouri has a better record in that regard.

"Oregon State is capable of beating any team in the country," Knight said. "They beat Missouri last year and they beat you last year. So, that shows you what kind of team they are."

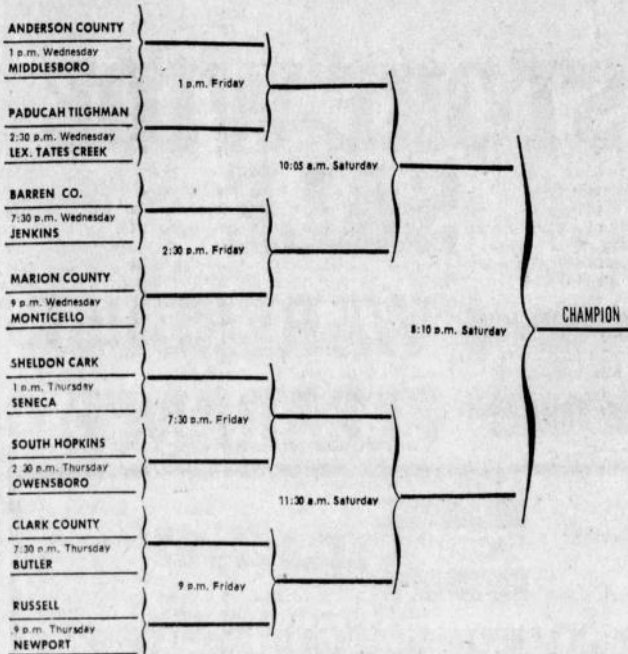

Butler Eliminates Clark Girls 60-28

Floundering almost 11 minutes without a score during the second half, the Clark girls' basketball squad saw its outstanding season end Thursday night with a crushing 60-28 loss to Louisville Butler in the first round of the Girls' State Tournament at Richmond.

"We played some good defense in the third quarter," sighed Clark guard Joyce Bates, "but we weren't shooting that much, and when we did shoot, we missed."

Butler, ranked the pre-tourney favorite and representing the powerful Sixth Region, held a 29-28 halftime lead behind the 15-point production of 5-10 forward Valerie Owens, who raked off 17 rebounds in the first two quarters, hit four-of-10 from the field and seven-of-nine from the foul stripe to stake the Bearettes to their 14-point bulge.

The Cardinals rallied, as junior forward Bev Anderson drove in for two on the second-half tipoff, center Leola Jackson cashed an eight-footer, and Bates laid in two after a steal, the Cards' third theft behind a trapping defense in the first two minutes. The margin was down to eight.

But after hitting three-of-three in the sport, Clark missed 13 straight shots before the end of the quarter; the Cards watched as Butler, held scores for the first five and one-half minutes of the ball, railed on baseline jumpers by

Susan Vittliow and Nancy Meredith and two close-in buckets by Owens to grab a 40-24 advantage entering the closing stanza.

The 14-point favorites pulled away down the stretch, hitting 7-0-11 from the field in the last eight minutes, while Clark, failing to score until 3:55 was left in the game, sunk but two-of-14.

"That's our worst shooting of the season," grimaced Clark coach Dave Dening, and the figures bore out his claim. The Cards bagged just 11-of-40 from the field for a frigid 18.3 per cent, and converted six-of-22 from the charity stripe (27.3 per cent).

"We stopped our rally with our offense," said Dening, shaking his head, "we were

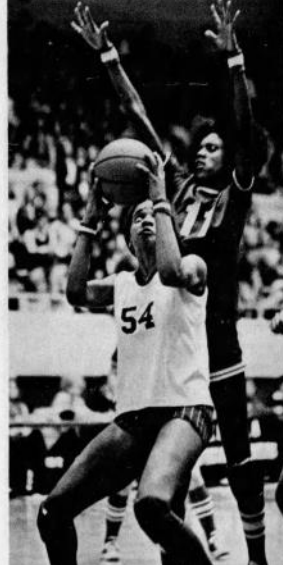
trapping the ball well in the third quarter, but just couldn't convert, couldn't get it to the hole."

"I think Butler will win it all," continued Dening, who finished 22-3 in his first year of coaching, "but I tell you, there's about 12 other teams in this tournament that I'd like to play."

Both Bates, who finished with 10 points, and Jackson, who collected nine, agreed the Louisville team should take home the first girls' title in this state since 1922.
Perhaps rattled by the college arena and the 3,300 fans in attendance, the Cards were victimized by nine steals and 14 mistakes in all in the opening quarter to fall 17-7 behind; although they reduced their turnovers to five in the second five minutes, their cold shooting continued, setting up Butler's halftime lead and later paving the way for a fatal 11-minute drought.

Owens, who topped all rebounders with 24, also took scoring honors with 25, sinking nine-of-19 from the floor, all from close range. Vittliow finished with 10 points as Butler overcame a cool first half to finish with a 25-40 showing for 42.3 per cent, and also sunk 16-of-21 foul shots for 76.2 per cent. Clark lost the battle 48-38 with Pam Dietler and Jackson leading the Cards in that category with 17 and 11, respectively, but posted a slight edge in turnovers, committing 34 to Butler's 35.

Bates, Jackson and guard Charles Elta Simmons were playing the final game of their one-year high school careers, as all are seniors.

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Adolph Rupp, the man who made University of Kentucky basketball famous, arrived with the club for the National Collegiate Athletic Association finals in San Diego.

But this was a team that someone else built. Rupp now 73, was forced into retirement three years ago when he didn't want to quit. Joe

Hall, one of his former players, assumed the reins of the school look from the Baron when he reached 76. The current team, with its 23-4 record, came via recruiting by Hall. This is his team, without the influence of Rupp, whose clubs in the past won four NCAA titles, 27 Southeast Conference crowns and two score All-Americans.

"I'm very, very proud of Coach Hall," now says Rupp, who wasn't happy to greet any successor. "He's done a great job. I think this is the strongest Kentucky team since 1948-49 and I'd be disappointed if we don't win it all."

Kentucky ranks as the No. 2 choice behind UCLA, which seeks its 10th NCAA title under Coach John Wooden since 1964, in that long span. The Bruins have only lost twice—the latest to last year's eventual champion, North Carolina State, which didn't qualify for this tournament.

The physically powerful Wildcats of Kentucky open Saturday against surprising Syracuse at 12:10 p.m. PDT, followed by the UCLA-Louisville battle at 2:10. The winners tangle for the national title on Monday with all games at the already sold-out San Diego Sports Arena.

Hall's Kentucky team won No. 2 rating in The Associated Press poll behind UCLA after the regional tournaments. The Wildcats hand the previous No. 1, Indiana, its only loss of the season, 82-96.
